A visit from Stonier Wines for an evening of wine tasting was a highlight and a perfect mix of education and entertainment.

To enhance our culinary experiences, the club upgraded its kitchen equipment, enabling the Somers General Store to expand its menu options. Our new coffee machine has been a hit, especially among the younger crowd enjoying a hot chocolate after a chilly day on the water.


