Keeping our bar licence safe

Club Liquor Licence - VCGLR No.36069125

OUR club is fortunate in having a liquor licence and we need to ensure that we comply with its conditions so it is important that members understand the rules and regulations that apply and ensure that everyone obeys these rules. Here our licence nominee, **Bob Welch**, explains what is involved.

Conditions of use:

I would like to bring to your attention the details, regulations and the rules of the Somers Yacht Club Liquor Licence. The licence is a Limited Licence renewable yearly. The club has appointed Bob Welch as the nominated (Nominee) person who is the responsible person to the Victorian Government Regulator for application of the rules and regulations of the licence.

The main regulations that apply to the Somers Yacht Club are as follows;

before closing times

1. Signing in of guests whilst the bar is open. All guests of members must be signed in at the front door of the club on the official register. The Licensing Board will send around without notice inspectors (police, authorized board inspectors.) to check that we are operating the licence according to the rules and regulations.

It is the responsibility of the club member to ensure that all their guests are signed in individually. This occurs separately on all occasions the member has guests.

2. The Area of the club where you can drink alcohol.

There is a map hanging on the bar wall which designates the area in which you can drink at the club. This is called the redline area. The area includes inside the first floor of the club and the front balcony, rear balcony and side balcony. It does <u>not</u> include the stairs leading up to the first floor, the stairs on the west side of the outside

balcony, the stairs leading to the boat yard on the east side of the outside balcony, the control tower and the boat yard itself.

3. Our bar's trading hours .

The club's licence hangs on the wall of the bar for all members to inspect.

Monday – Saturday Between 11am – 10pm. Sunday Between 11am – 9pm.

Closing times Special Hours

Friday No more than five days to midnight Saturdays No more than 12 days to midnight No more than 5 days to 10 pm

New Year's Eve To 1am

Please note that last drinks will be served no later than 30 minutes.

Reference here is made to the Somers Yacht Club Rules of incorporation and the Liquor Control Reform Act which are the same.

The main provisions that the Somers Members should be aware of:

4. Serving liquor to under age persons i.e. Under 18 years of age.

All members are responsible to ensure that their party at any particular time does not include underage drinking.

Any person over 18 years of age who procures an alcoholic drink for an underage is liable to the Act

Nominee Penalty \$17,000.

Person who serves the alcohol person \$17,000. Underage person drinking on the premises \$700. Please note that an underage person who is in the presence of their parents or guardian can drink an alcohol beverage whilst partaking in a meal with them.

The bar person has a legal right to ask for proof of age of any patron of the bar.

5. Drunk and disorderly

Any person who is drunk and disorderly and is deemed that by the person in control of the bar is not to be served alcohol and can be removed from the premises if deemed to be a problem with the full backing of the law.

Nominee penalty \$17,000

Serving alcohol to an intoxicated person \$17,000 Intoxicated person \$7000

We at the Somers Yacht Club have been an orderly lot and to date we have not had any cases of underage drinking nor have we had any persons being drunk and disorderly. It is still up to every member of the club to be vigilant and be sure that the rules are strictly abided by. The bar committee is to be commended for the running of the bar (an onerous task) throughout the year. It raises very important funds around the \$30000 per year, which the club can allocate to specific club projects. This is where the social members are really contributing to our club. It is important that we have volunteers within the club membership to put their names forward to be on the bar roster. Volunteer bar people are what makes the profit. Volunteering for the bar helps you get to know other club members while doing a worthwhile job in support of the club.

Membership

THERE are still a few members who have not renewed their membership for 2015-16.

The rules of the club state that if payment is not received by 31 December, membership will be suspended.
