Since last report, we've had sailors out and about, starting with the Westernport Laser Regatta. Four of our sailors represented our club in a fleet of 16 boats. After 3 races, Richard Jagger won both the Overall and Masters Division, with Wendy Wilson winning the Womens division. Steve Clifford, David Fakhry and Michael Bailey also made the trip over to race. Thanks again to Point Leo for hosting with their trademark hospitality.

Wendy Wilson, along with Libby Moore, competed at the Sabre State Titles over at Safety Beach. In a large and highly competitive fleet, I'm sure they've both learnt a lot about how to position on busy start lines and sailing in large fleets, and will no doubt bring those skills to bear during our remaining races.

Closer to home, the weather was kind to us on the Australia Day weekend, with 77 finishing at least one race in the Commodores Cup/Williams Pt Regatta. A fantastic turnout, and it really showcases our club as one of the top off the beach clubs in the state.

With all the activity going on around the club, I'd like to show my appreciation for the effort our tower and rescue boat volunteers give every week. On any given Saturday, there are at least six volunteers in the tower, ten people on our rescue boats, as well as our tractor drivers, bar volunteers, and those that help get the rescue boats on the trailers at the end of the day. To each of you – THANK YOU! Your assistance contributes towards the enjoyment of our sailors, and to the strength of our community.

For the rest of us, there are few things we can do to aid our volunteers. I've personally learnt a lot from sitting in the tower on race days, and seeing what is going on. I encourage anyone to spend an afternoon in the race management, and get an appreciation of the hum of activity that goes on up there. At the end of the day, please get down to the beach and give the team a hand to get the rescue boats hitched onto the tractor. It's the little things like this, when shared around, help to make things run smoothly.

The Windward Mark bar is a great place to come and have a chat about what you like about our racing program, and how we can do even better. One of the major talking points has been that our back to back races are on the longer side of ideal. Our race management team aim for a target time of around 40 - 45 mins, and the team have made some great progress towards getting the course length right, but we're not quite there yet. Between looking at shortening course lengths, reducing laps, or using our Shorten Course flag more, we're going to keep working to get the balance right. Stay tuned, and keep the feedback coming - we are listening!

Finally, we're looking forward to welcoming Hobies from near and far to Somers on the March long weekend for their State Titles. Word on the street is that up to 40 boats will be gracing our waters, and there will be plenty of fun activity, both on and off the water. These events don't happen without a significant amount of planning and volunteer hours, so thank you to those who have contributed.

Division 3 -Nick Carter

The sailing conditions this season continue to be a challenge with winds generally from the East or South in the 15-20+ knot range. Hats off the Race Officers and Rescue Boat Crews, for managing the racing in these challenging conditions.

The Laser Radials skippered by Nick and Richard have been performing well in the bigger breezes, as have the Contenders driven by Michael and Patrick. At the time of writing, the two Contenders are pretty much locked together in the championship series with a win a piece, with Mike's Impulse occupying the Bronze Medal position for now. Lighter breezes between 5-7knots with lumpy sea's and heavy tides, have been forecast for all races up until the end of the season, meaning the planing boats will struggle and the skippers of the displacement hull boats will be set to dominate. (yeah right!!)

Phil and Oliver Schwarz competed this year in Sail Melbourne and you can indeed see glimpses of them on YouTube at the event in Brighton. They have come back to the local competition full of world class fleet experience, and right out of the blocks (in lighter conditions for two races in the Commodores Cup), basically blitzed the fleet, with a 3rd in heat 1 and a win in heat 5. This series was won by Michael Vandenberg, with Glenn and Sean making up the podium positions.

The Norm Dewar Series Heat 2 was a drag race, between the Tasar of Amanda and Maureen and the Finn. One lap (post the Championship race) in the rain, clouds, heavy breeze with big sea's, was very very enjoyable indeed, it was one of those "good to be alive moments" for me anyway. The Tasar took the honours with a 40 second win over the Finn. For the record, I really like the two race format, especially if race 1 is a true long course event, it gives all classes time to settle into a pattern, recover from mistakes or capitalise on good decisions; it also brings the physicality of the sport into play, something that you will need if sailing a regatta series outside the club environment. Finally, starts have been more competitive this year, with what seems like smaller lines and more boats; some skippers choosing to luff on the line with an outgoing tide (that's always good to watch), others opting for a Port Start (Mr Commodore) and other skippers putting late comers to the line, into the start boat, all conducted in good spirits and in good fun. The start process in a close fleet, really does emphasises the need to get the first hundred meters or so off the line right, in order that you secure clean air, and ensure you are well positioned for the first reach to maximise or defend any advantage that you have at the top mark.

It is a fast-paced racing style which encourages good boat handling skills and rapid tactical decision making.

But it's great fun, combining all the strategic and physical attributes of both sailing and team sports. And it pays to know your sailing rules. For example, boats have the option to do one penalty turn after an infringement. If you don't do the spin, you do two penalty turns if you choose to sail on and are penalised by an umpire.

The course was short, and with reasonable wind each race took less than thirty minutes.

The day produced a total of ten teams; two from Flinders, four from Westernport, three from Merricks and one from Somers. Our team, Somers Birds of Spray, comprised Libby M, Wendy D, Caitlin D, Wendy W, Sophie D, Maddi M, Lisa T and Colleen M.


