As we move into Winter recess, the activity around the club will of course reduce, but the work won't stop. Running a volunteer club of over 800 members takes a huge effort. As with Steph, many of our stalwart volunteers are also indicating their intention to take a step back. To that end, one of the challenges for the off season will be to expand our volunteer base. Remembering the club is only what the members make of it, we will be planning a series of "How to Volunteer" sessions as we move into the next season. We look forward to seeing you then. OUR FACILITIES AND FINANCE

We are fast approaching the end of the sailing season. For the facility and boat yard this means we hold our end of season Working Bee. Working Bees are traditionally held twice a year. One at the commencement of the Sailing season and one at the close. Covid has indeed made this difficult over the last 18 months or so but we can now get back to business. It is always a fun morning with friends and members and a delicious morning tea too.

By the time this goes to print the April working bee will have been completed, HOWEVER, we may hold another mini working bee in the next few weeks to complete a few extra tasks. So if you were not able to attend this one, you can help with the next!!

David has assembled a 'Maintenance Shed' under the back stairs. This is a temporary measure to help with safe storage of our equipment and ensure easy access to the equipment when needed. It means we no longer need to store these supplies and equipment in the Bar Storage area and Sailing School container.

As you may already know there is a <u>Master Plan</u> for the Club's future development being put together in collaboration with all members. Our current financial position means we can indeed consider and plan for changes.

5. Avoid Interactions in Enclosed Spaces - Look for the signs indicating density limits in all our areas, especially the bathrooms and change rooms. Our maximum capacity upstairs remains at 100.


In closing, I'm looking forward to seeing you all at Presentation Night on the 29th May to celebrate the season that was!




Hobbie Hawk fleet





Division 3



The end of the season is nearly upon us, and between lock downs and bad weather it has been somewhat challenging.

Congratulations again to Patrick who has taken out the Championship with a dominating performance, followed by Michael and Mike rounding out the podium. Heavy weather dominated the first 2 races of the Autumn series, with smaller fleets but some exciting racing none the less. Tasar and Contenders have been the fastest in these breezy conditions with excellent up wind speed this year ensuring that by half way down the first reach, its pretty much all over, with not many changes of positions taking place. Good to see Nigel out in his fathers old Tasar complete with Dacron sails, the transition from 2 hulls to 1, did not seem to faze the father daughter duo, with Abby hiking like a veteran in the first two heats of the Autumn series; could this be the foundations of a defection from Div. 1 to 3?

Some notable instances took place since we last reported; David Fakhry sailed his Laser in heavy conditions with the "bung" out; half of Westernport was sucked into his boat, this made the on beach retrieval good to watch; note the other half was in Morgan's A Class (seam crack in centre board case now fixed) Harrison Ede had one race where things just fell off or broke, and while he was on the pace, its difficult to build momentum when you are in the drink due to gear failure (Important to note that once Harrison gets this all sorted, I expect to see him for sure pushing for line honours) Our Rear Commodore had one race where the Contender's many idiosyncrasies, combined with tide and mixed fleet weather mark rounding proved too much, and his thoughts on the matter could be heard in Cowes; I must say that we have all been there, but it's good to see that even the most talented sailors can have "one of those days"

Finally, the Finn. I love heavy weather, the windier, colder and more difficult the sea state is the better. Last week was one of those races, not really heavy around 20 knots, but enough for me to "don" the helmet, prudent with the Finns boom rocketing at supersonic speed across the deck. Anyway, I tucked my hat, complete with its safety rope into the front of my life jacket, apparently safe and secure. At the first mark I was in the mix with the fleet, and I tacked onto

port for what should have been a short 20-meter tack to the mark. As I tacked my hat fell out of my life jacket and the rope securing it became wedged into the mainsheet block as I was half way through the tack. So, you guessed it, given I could not fully release the mainsheet over I went, with my hat rope wedged into the block. I must admit to having a very short moment where I thought this could be interesting as the boat was upside down and I had my face firmly stuck in the upturned hull attached to the mainsheet block. My 40 years at the gym finally paid off and I all but yanked the bottom of the boat off and freed my hat and so myself. The boat turtle, the centre board unable to be retrieved due to less than satisfactory tensioning elastic, after 20 minutes of trying, I was unable to right the boat without "jump crew" assistance. Janis was on scene early hovering like a protective brother, and relayed the message to SA11, that I needed assistance and they promptly arrived. Simon Boadle jumped in and with little instruction perched on the gunnel with legs under the boat onto the centre board leveraging it just enough for me to grab it, and get the boat back into the wind and to its natural state. Simon then jumped onto the bow, held it into the wind while I pulled myself aboard. I cleaned up the sheets, sailed the next lap, and went back to the start ready for race two.

So, what were the lessons here for me?

1. Somers Sea Rescue drivers and permanent crews were well and truly up to the task.

2. Experienced sailors as jump crews are very important, thanks to Janus and Simon. Simon was able to execute without instruction from me; this is a big + when you have been in the water for 15-20 minutes or so.

3. Even people who have been sailing for 50 years, can and will get into trouble. If I was out on my own, I am not sure what the outcome would have been. Always sail with someone, and preferably with rescue craft.

4. If you had 1 million tries at having your hat cord sucked/wrapped into the mainsheet block, I reckon you could not do it!! See you on the water! Nick Carter



SASSY

"SASSY" Shesails at Somers YC was held on Sunday 28 February 2021. We were very fortunate to have ideal weather-a sunny 25 degrees and light winds!

Thirty-three boats including Pacers(13), Sabres(8), 125s(5), Hobie Hawks(3), Laser4.7(1), Hobie14(2) and Hobie16(1) participated. Nineteen boats and thirty-one sailors were Somers members.

Sea Rescue

For some years now I have been number three of a three man crew on Somers Yacht Club Start Boat SA4.

The number one is Skipper Gerry Lewis and number two Richard (Black Flag) Fakhry.

We have developed into well run team and for most of the time get the Race Start procedure efficiently carried out with a good start line. However sometimes challenges occur putting the three crew members into (possibly) near panic.

For example in rough weather the boat can drag the anchor and the start line needs adjustment. This sometimes involves pulling up the anchor and repositioning the boat, all very strenuous for this older group. (Cumulative age 240 years).

Occasionally one of the flags will get entangled on the way up, usually the Blue Peter needing a lot of rope shaking to free

Two of us have stop watches for the timing and sometimes the count is interrupted by radio chatter, only once have we been a second or so late. Speaking of radio communications, the tower, particularly for the second race often only gives us a few seconds notice which division or divisions are to start next. Usually we manage to fumble the correct flags into place and have a smooth start.

We did have a big disappointment the other day when after a general recall we raised the black flag, Richard was delighted! However on the next start there were so many boats crossing the line early that we could not take their numbers so after another recall we just had an ordinary start. Occasionally with the permission of the Race Officer we have a visitor on board, your Newsletter Editor, Colleen was one of those. She helped with the flag raising and was very efficient.

A younger crew is needed to eventually take over these duties and anyone wishing to experience the start boat should get in touch with a General Committee member, a Race Officer or our Club Captain. (Sorry that the photo does not include Richard, Tim was standing in at the time)


Know Your Flags (Part 5) – Uncommonly used flags.

In sailing we use flags to communicate necessary messages and instructions to sailors on and off the water. In this series of articles, we would like to explain the flag signals of racing, and what the race management team are expecting from sailors.

Part 1 of this series discussed flags used to postpone races, part 2 discussed flags used to start races, part 3 discussed flags to Stop races, part 4 discussed flags used to Change the Course. If you missed either part 1, part 2, part 3 or part 4 dig up a copies of the previous newsletters. Part 1 also contains the internet location of the Racing Rules of Sailing published by World Sailing.

In part 5 we cover uncommonly used flags.

<u>L Flag</u>



The L flag can be raised ashore or from a committee boat. Its meaning differs depending on whether raised ashore or raised from a committee boat.

Ashore: it means there is a notice to sailors posted on the official notice board. Often this is a change to sailing instructions but could be used for any notice.

Afloat: It means follow this vessel or come within hailing distance.

Sound

1 Sound signals when raised. The sound signals are to draw attention to the raising but the signal is still valid if the sound fails.

What it means for Somers Sailors

At Somers, it is most often used ashore to indicate changes to sailing instructions or to draw attention to a notice posted for sailors. It is rarely used afloat but could be used when the windward mark is difficult to see. A committee boat will raise the L flag and move toward the windward mark with the fleet following until boats are close enough to the mark to be easily visible.

M Flag



This flag is used to replace a mark that is missing. So if a mark sinks or breaks its mooring and floats away during a race, a committee boat will anchor where the mark should be, raise the flag and make continuous sound signals as boats approach.

Sound

Continuous Sound signals when raised. The sound signals are mandatory to draw attention.

What it means for Somers Sailors

Rarely used but could be if a mark moves out of position.

Y Flag



^∙

When raise it indicates that you must wear a floatation device. This is rarely, if ever, used in dinghy sailing in Australia because it is **mandatory** to wear a buoyancy vest at all times while afloat.

This could be used for trailer sailor or keelboat racing where the race committee has determined that racing conditions require an extra level of safety and floatation devices to be worn.

Sound

1 sound signals when raised. The sound signals are to draw attention to the raising but the signal is still valid if the sound fails.

Sailing Rule Rule 40 applies.

What it means for Somers Sailors

This is never used at Somers because it is **mandatory** for dinghy sailors to wear buoyancy vests while afloat.




Know Your Flags (Part 5) – Uncommonly used flags.

Blue Flag



(no sound)

This is a blue flag or shape raised on a committee boat to indicate it is on station at the finish line. Not used in club racing at Somers but almost always used in state and national titles.





This flag is specific to Somers and can be displayed ashore or afloat.

If raised ashore it indicates that the sailing conditions are not safe for Novice or inexperienced sailors and they should not sail.

The Rebuilding of Somers Yacht Club

After the early morning loss our building (about 6am) Saturday 18th August from a violent wind gust (someone had left the windows open to remove the smell of the newly painted floor) and the top floor, walls, windows and asbestos roof were blown into the boat yard. This is the story of how we went about the

rebuilding and kept the 2001-2002 sailing season alive.

Andy Griffin, then the Vice Commodore, convened a meeting at 10 am in the tower (the only room left on the top floor) and then set up a committee which included a great mix of skills to oversee the rebuilding. He appointed John Hatton as chairman. Given John's experience it was a great decision.

The major tasks were identified and allocated and many people who co-opted. John had a copy of the minutes printed that afternoon so everyone was aware of the job tasks they had been allocated

Over the next two weeks we met daily and the major issues were:

Making an inventory and removal of most items to storage off site Finding old architects drawing of club Removal of the asbestos from the boat yard Recover the club information ie honour boards etc.

Arranging for hire of 2 shipping containers one for long term storage and the other to store all the sailing equipment so we could still go sailing racing

When the insurance company appointed a builder, and after our negotiations with the insurance adjuster, we arranged to have the gents toilets and HOT showers to be still working so our sailing was not affected too much.

Vern Tansley took charge of the redesign of the club including a larger commercial kitchen and after prodding enlarged the bar space. Many people gave their help and Mike North a friend of Geoff Rae donated a lot of the plumbing equipment while Andy Griffin was at Greys Auctions buying 2 large fridges, stoves, washers and tables for the kitchen

By the time the work was finished the cost had escalated to \$330,000 for the building (\$280,000 covered by insurance) and our insurers paid additional \$12,000 insurance for contents and \$50,000 for the costs.

Two Interesting facts:

1. When the club was destroyed the Sunday ABC news which was usually transmitted from Sydney, but due to a fire, ABC Melbourne did the national news and the lead item was Somers Yacht Club. As a result we had many phone calls of assistance.

2. We decided to replace the wooden deck out the front including near the tower. as we were removing the planks. The complete bay of decking had crashed to the ground. We were so lucky that with the fireworks display on new year, the fireworks were let off in the rocks to the east of the club.


