OUR FACILITIES AND FINANCE

Somers Yacht Club 'Master Plan'.

The Finance and Planning Committee in collaboration with Cameron Harvey have begun work on further development of this plan so it can be presented to the General Committee and then members in the near future. There are a number of short term, medium term and long term developments to consider and plan for in light of the outcomes of the Strategic Review. Some of the many important issues to consider are: potential coastal hazards; the need to liaise closely with our local council regarding this and the potential impact on our club, yard space and beach access; and of course the financing and fund raising these plans may require. The intention of the club's 'Master Plan' is to present initiatives for the future development of the club in this unique coastal community on our beautiful Westernport Bay.

Since our last Newsletter, surprisingly, we have managed to have some works completed in between lockdowns.

Roof Works – the work to replace all roofing screws and some down-pipe clips has been completed by our local roofing plumber.

Floor resurfaced upstairs – the timber floors, which were showing considerable damage, have been resurfaced.

Boatyard tree inspection – an Arborist has completed a re-

port on the trees in the boat yard and listed the work required to make them safe and ensure they remain healthy. Quotes were obtained to have this work completed as soon as possible. The aim is to have the work completed before the sailing season commences.

South Deck Engineer Report – an engineer has been appointed to complete this task. He will attend the club as soon as current restrictions allow.

Working Bee plans – we have completed a maintenance check of the club and put together a very extensive list of tasks to complete once we are free from Covid restrictions and Australian Sailing restrictions to group sizes and access to our facility. This working bee will also include a specific maintenance team of workers to perform works required on the tower.

We will most certainly let you know as soon as possible when this working bee can take place. The notification will include a list of works. We really appreciate the volunteer culture of this club. Everyone is welcome, having a specific skill is not a pre requisite, there is always something you can do to help.



Rear Commodore's Report

Robert Cialdini, author of 'Influence: The Power of Persuasion' calls this 'social proof'. Social proof is the theory that people will do things that they see other people are doing. In a self-policing sport like sailing, the social proof of following the rules is what keeps our sport safe and fun.

Sailing, as in life, has rules that govern what we can and can't do. These rules exist to protect us, and ensure that our sport remains fair. We are all subject to the same rules. That means doing penalty turns when we infringe or giving room to another boat when needed. There are times where we don't agree with the rules as they are set out. But, it is important that we respect the rules that are in place, act with integrity and do what is right. Doing the right thing has a

positive, compounding impact on everyone around us.

Looking at the conditions that we're experiencing, we will have a few AP (Answering Pennant) post-ponements go up this season. We may have a few false starts, and lockdowns may delay or prevent us from running things in an ideal way. But as sailors, we are adaptable. That AP flag will come down. The starter's horn will sound. We will get back into cruising, sailing and racing among friends.

You'll soon receive the program for the 2021/22 season in your membership mail-out. Besides our usual program of events, we've added more Social Sailing and cruises. Thank you to everyone who provided input through direct discussion or the Strategic Review. I hope that the program reflects your feedback.

Running a sailing club is hard in the best of times, and it feels like we can only react to what is happening around us. Sailing Committee is a hidden engine room within the club that flies under the radar. Each member of the committee advocates for each of our sailors and volunteers. 

Sea Rescue

Somers Sea Rescue is responsible for running our on-water activities and welcoming visiting sailors to our club during major events. Sea Rescue also ensures that all our sailors can enjoy Westernport Bay and the sport of sailing in a safe manner. Some of the roles that our volunteers fill include:

- Start Boat Crews including timekeepers, flag signals and skippering
- Course Laying Boat Skippers and Crews
- Safety Boat Skippers and Crew
- Launching and Retrieving Sea Rescue Boats
- Support during major events (eg. State and National Championships)

Our volunteers range from those who volunteer regularly, to those who only volunteer once or twice a year. There is no minimum commitment required to volunteer. Any level of experience is welcomed! Whilst some roles require certain qualifications, many of our roles only require a willingness to work as part of a team. The club can assist with helping you attain any certifications required to fulfill these roles.

Race Management

Race management volunteers are the backbone of our sailing activities. With a wide range of tasks ranging from power boat support to radio communications to safety observation, each role is vital to a successful sailing event. No prior experience is required, only a willingness to listen, learn and be part of a team dedicated to the safety of our sailors.

Winter 2021

Well, it seems that we are stuck in the same place as we were last year, all be it with the possibility of this shemozzle ending as the vaccine rolls out; let's hope that it all comes together for our sailing program this summer.

I hear on the grape vine that the wind will be fair and the seas kind.

In the absence of anything substantial happening apart from being locked down, I thought I would take advantage again of this news letter and indulge myself with all things Finn and Motorcycles. I can hear the collective yawns, but hang in there this could be interesting.

Finn and the Olympics

The 2020 Olympics were for me unlike any other, with 7+ at least giving solid coverage of all the sailing, with some very exciting and close racing across all the classes. Our Olympic Finn sailor Jake Lily, came away with a 7th overall, and an impressive 3rd in the all-important medal race in Tokyo.

Giles Scott took back-to-back gold medals, with what can only be described as a magical come back from what was a disastrous start in the medal race. Its amazing how some sailors simply know which way to go.

Giles Scott needed a solid result in the last race to protect his gold medal position, but made a critical error on the start line, which saw him have to go back across the line and effectively restart at the back of the fleet; at this stage his gold medal had simply evaporated.

Jake Lily went left while the balance of the fleet

went right: Giles who was now last, chose to go left and take Jakes side of the course. You could see within the first 300 meters of his choice that this was now the favoured side of the course, most of his prestart errors were replaced with solid gains, sailing higher and faster; by the top mark Giles rounded 5th from memory, and Jake led all the way down the first return.

Anyway, this continued up the next beat with Jake still leading and Giles back in the mix. The wind dropped off and it was a real battle of wits down the last run to the gate and line. The fleet was swallowing up Jake's lead as his wind was snuffed out from behind; the last mark and finish line saw from memory 5-6 boats all within 15 meters of each other drifting to the line, this would determine the medals. And you guessed it Giles Scott recovered, held his nerve, did not panic and takes the gold! This is what it is all about; we all know how difficult it is to take positions when sailing in a fleet, let alone recover from last place to take gold. I suppose this is why they are in Tokyo and most of us remain happy and content club sailors.

Sadly, after what has been a 4-year battle with the IOC, the Finn Class (the oldest Olympic Sailing Class) has been dropped as an Olympic Class boat; effectively providing zero possibility for sailors over 80kg to compete at future games and crushing my personal dream of becoming the oldest Olympic Finn Sailor, so Paris is now off for me.

Justin and Gina's Sailing Trip

Late last year we bought a Farr 7500 from Tasmania, sight unseen, with a plan for an escape from Melbourne this winter. These are well respected solid cruising boats that are quite capable in protected waters. They have a large v berth forward, double metho stove, ice box, outboard motor and wind up keel. Ours was fitted with an autopilot and furling head sail, both of which we had never used before. After some trailer repairs and a short two hour sail on Westernport we headed north in May. This was our plan B trip after the 2020 writeoff of our planned cycle from Portugal to Norway. Despite this being our fourth trailer sailor, we were relatively still inexperienced trailer sailors.



Our first stop was back at Valla Beach where we lived and raised our two children for 20 years. Lots of catching up with old friends, surfing and enjoying being about in shorts and t shirts. After some difficulty getting the swing keel to drop from its case, we launched from Southport and explored the Stradbroke/Moreton islands.



Next was a launch from Tin Can Bay to cruise the Great Sandy Straits to Harvey Bay.

We Saw our first whale being a dwarf minke and spent two nights at Kingfisher Bay Resort on Fraser swimming in the pool. Then launched from Rosslyn Bay Marina in Yeppoon for a run out to Great Keppell Island. This became our favourite cruising destination. Very laid back, crystal clear water, sunset cocktails at the beach bar and lots of inland walking tracks to explore.



The Whitsundays was our next stop and proved to be quite a challenge to sail in a small boat. The southeast trade winds were blowing to 25 knots most days and we quickly learned how to reduce sail area to match the wind speed.

Our next stop north was to Magnetic Island, with a launch from Townsville. We spent a great week anchored in Horseshoe Bay, fishing, swimming and relaxing with new friends. The Hinchinbrook Channel marked our furthest point north of the trip. We had encounters with crocs and midgies, but the scenery was spectacular. Sad to see the devastation of cyclones to Cardwell marina from where we had once chartered a bigger boat. We made it out to Orpheus Island in the Palm Island Group for some spectacular snorkelling on coral reefs.

We returned to the Whitsundays and found a weather window to complete our exploration of the islands. After a night in Airlie to celebrate our 30th wedding anniversary, we finally got to Whitehaven Beach and Butterfly Bay. This was when we had some very close encounters with breeching hump-back whales that was a bit scary. We feel very fortunate to have pulled off this trip and are happy to be home preparing for another season of sailing in Somers.

Our favourite anchorage was Nara Inlet on Hook Island, closely followed by Happy Bay on Long Island that we visited three times. We completed this leg with a dramatic sail in 32 knots from Hayman Island to Gloucester Island, recording our top speed of 9 knots. It was a relief to get away from the rude and noisy charter boats and enjoy the company of the identical twin Wilson brothers Blackrock, who have trailer sailed the northern Whitsundays for the past 20 years.



We returned to Great Keppell for another week of fun in the sun. Completed our circumnavigation of the Island and speared a coral trout that we barbequed on the Lewis's Magma BBQ. The trip ended a bit weird. With NSW starting to struggle, we responded to a wanted ad from someone in Qld looking for our boat. A quick sale and then a dash through regional NSW before things got out of hand. We will get another trailer sailor in the near future as we both enjoy this caravanning on water lifestyle.

A Fascinating Maritime Museum close to Somers.

The Max Bryant Family have lived in Hastings since 1864.

In the Year 2000 Max developed an idea to be the genesis of providing a Community Project that would provide interest to the immediate Community plus Tourism and employment opportunities. Because of Hastings close association with the sea and the nearby HMAS Cerberus he decided upon a Maritime theme.

In 2003 the Australian Government decided through the Department of Defence to sell off their ageing Oberon Class Submarines. Max along with his Board approached the Government for a Grant to purchase one of the Submarines namely the Otama. This acquisition eventually occurred and with considerable cost was towed from Western Australia to Crib Point where it is clearly visible from the Sea Shore. It is the intention of the Board to eventually bring the Submarine ashore and have it displayed at the Victorian Maritime Centre which is located across road from the Submarine. This Museum is located in an attractive building which was previously used by the BP Oil Company for their Western Port Administrative Offices.

The Maritime Museum also is the home of the Western Port Oberon Association.

It has much to offer as it displays Naval War Memorabilia including Battle Ship Guns, a huge Mural of War Conflict, Torpedoes, Naval Uniforms plus models and items from War Ships.

The other side of the Museum features General Maritime which includes excellent models of Passenger Ships from the 50's and 60's and other memorabilia.

The Maritime Museum provides a fascinating display which both young and old will find most interesting.

Of more recent times the Museum has also purchased the MV Wyuna known as "Australia's Britannia" was constructed in Scotland in1952 off the

plans of the Royal Yacht Britannia. This ship was used as a Pilot Ship in Port Phillip Bay and later at the Nautical College in Launceston where it is currently anchored off Bell Bay in the Tamar River. The Museum is seeking a Government Grant to assist in returning the MV Wyuna home to Victoria.

The Museum which is staffed by volunteers is open on Saturdays and Sundays between 10.00 am and 3.00pm. The Admission Charge is very reasonable.

Group visitations can be arranged during the week and Morning or Afternoon Tea can be provided if required.

Somers Yacht Club Strategic Directions Working Group

Back in April of this year, members were asked to participate in a survey and a forum to help with a review of the club's offerings.

The impetus for this introspection was a changing member demographic resulting from the success of initiatives to get more young adults and families involved with the club, the impact on club life of Covid-19 uncertainty and unresolved priorities for infrastructure and equipment expenditure.

A working group of nine members gathered the responses together with a range of stakeholder input and submitted a report to the general committee in June.

The working group found overwhelming support for the club as a successful volunteer-based sailing club providing a range of off-the-beach sailing opportunities and generating a deeply valued sense of community.

The club's fee structures, and its sailing and social programs were strongly endorsed. It is a testament to the workings of the club that by the time the working group reported to the General Committee on these programs, many suggestions from members and many of the working group's proposals were already being addressed!

In the key area of capital expenditure for

equipment and infrastructure, no clear priorities emerged. Instead, the working group recommended that capital expenditure should remain limited until a Master Plan and a Capital Expenditure Plan are able to express clear priorities. This work is now underway.

The rest of the working group's suggestions focussed on "organisational recommendations". These are intended to simplify the way the club works by, for example, clarifying roles and responsibilities, managing succession, encouraging participation, managing risks, identifying future funding needs and so on. The organisational recommendations are intended to contribute to a resilient and flexible organisation that is in a position to respond appropriately to new and developing challenges.
