

All Divisions started on time, and the 14ft Div II saw 8 Somers boats with some great competition between the PT's and Phil coming in ahead of Steph after Gideon bottled just before the finish and coming 4th after Vlad, Malcolm, Zoe, Steve W and Maz. Great performance from Phil, finishing 13th overall Catamaran, and as the 16's being relegated into Div 1, Simon finishing 5th overall Cat. Well done Simon, Meagan, Nigel, Emma and Ant and crews. Austarlia day weekend was just one of those memorable times that we dream of. Saturday saw a steady 10 to 12 kts and sunshine, with a great tussle between the 14's and the 16's, resulting in various winners. Sunday started with a gentle sunny 8 to 10Kts, and building up to just below 20kts in the second race in which some of us holding on for grim death, and with a lot of DNFs. Championship 2 was sailed in fantastic Somers Sunshine and steady 10 kt start which died to near zero, with Emma heading Vlad, Steph, Phil, Malcolm, and Gideon, and the rest following. The 9th February was forecast all week to be a no sailing day, and so it turned out. Champ 4 saw another brilliant Somers Sunshine day with steady 12 to 15 kts dying a little towards the end. The 14's of Phil, Vlad and Steph took command after the start, and held on until the 16's took command with Maz and Emma heading Simon and Jo, and then Steph overtaking Phil at the Yellow

straightening mark and beating him by 9 seconds ahead of Nigel, and Vlad missing the straightening mark so having to go back around it, loosing him his position. Peter T headed Steve W just before the finish. Unfortunately I can't comment on the tussle the 16's were having as they are so far away. Champ 5 started a little late as the wind was playing games with our champion course layers, who got it nearly right, but after the start the wind changed again and lost it for some and gained it for others. The 14 footers gained great advantage over the 16 footers by taking out the first three places after a great battle. Champ 6 looked a bit dodgy as the Northerly was gusting strongly and which scared a lot of us off but the brave ones finished up having a great race with the 16's of Emma and Maz leading from Gideon, Nigel and Abi, then Eli and Gen, and Ant and Wil, with Peter T the only PT competing and finishing.

Division 4 –Nick Ede

2019 Victorian Laser Titles (McYC 9-10 February 2019) Report for Radial and 4.7

Richard Jagger, Nick Ede and Lucy Ede raced in the Radial whilst Daniel Laverty raced for the first time in a Laser 4.7. As noted above in Simon's report, Saturday was blown out and a cold windy Sunday morning greeted everyone. With great resolve, everyone got out on the water for an early 9.30AM start to enable a full 4 races to be completed with one drop. The first two races were held in 15-22knt overcast skies whereas the sun came out and the wind moderated a little for the final two races.

In the 39 strong Radial field, Lucy Ede led the way for Somers coming 15th and winning the Youth Women Championship! Richard Jagger was next with a consistent score card to come in 21st overall followed by Nick Ede in 26th.

Daniel Laverty raced with 18 4.7 competitors for the first time and with the winds being strong, he did exceptionally well. Daniel scored a 5th in Heat 3 which clearly demonstrated his future and potential in the class. Daniel has now bought Lucy Ede's fast boat (ex-STELLA) and is looking forward to the Victorian Youth Championships in April.

If not for some untimely capsizes, Lucy and Daniel would have finished closer to the top of the leader board. The first two races in particular were extremely brutal.

2019 Victorian Masters Laser Titles (RGYC 16-17 March 2019)

Simon Wilkins, Richard Jagger and Nick Ede checked out the venue for the 2020 Masters World Titles at Royal Geelong Yacht Club. See separate report from Simon for the full rigs.

Richard and Nick raced in the Radial against 28 competitors. Five heats over two days in light to moderate breezes were held under the excellent stewardship of PRO Peter Merritt. The racing was tight and hard with no quarter given. Champion Somers sailor and ex-world Laser Radial Grand Master Champion Martin White also came down from Sydney to compete (finishing 13th – how hot is the Victorian fleet!!??).

Richard sailed a brilliant and consistent series (8, 6, 6, 12, 16) to finish 8th overall and 4th Grand Master (55-64 yo). Nick sailed well but inconsistently (7, RET, 24, 16, 13) to finish 17th and 7th

Master (45-54 yo).

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The highlight was heat 1 where Richard and Nick were 1st and 2nd to the first mark! After a quick "good job" between us we got on with the job. Whilst we couldn't hold our lead, it was definitely a highlight for the regatta!

Optimist Victorian State Championships

The Optimist Victorian State championships were held over the March long weekend at the Royal Brighton yacht club in Melbourne. There were 105 youth sailors, with age ranges from 7 to 14 years old. The majority of children were from Victoria but some out-of-state and some international! Two New Zealanders came over to compete. In return there will be a group of twelve Victorian sailors crossing the Tasman Sea for the New Zealand National Optimist Championships this month.

At the Brighton State championships, there are 62 sailors in the open fleet, 25 in the intermediate fleet and 18 in green fleet. There were also rainbow fleet sessions for the very young sailors which were essentially learning to sail sessions held over the weekend. Daniel Laverty sailed in the open fleet and finished mid fleet. Chloe Laverty was in green fleet, also finishing in the middle. Lucy Laverty moved up from green fleet and sailed Quack' in the intermediate fleet. She took third place female in her fleet.

Overall the weather was favourable however on the Saturday there were some incredible wind shifts. I was working on a rescue boat and at one point we were towing the kids back to the beach in a daisychain as there was no wind. Surprisingly this shifted in a matter of a few minutes and we were soon rapidly unhooking the kids so they could get back to racing in 25 knots. This was a very challenging afternoon, there were numerous individual and group recalls as sailors were trying to get a good start. It was hard to hold your position on the line in the wind and waves. Ultimately black flags were needed. It was difficult for race organisers at the start line with the wind shifts. At one point the boat end was so biased that there was extreme congestion at that end with 61 sailors competing for the perfect spot on the line! There were quite a few capsizes that afternoon but no injuries nor distraught sailors. I was kept busy on the rescue boat and I also got very wet! Overall the event was a great success. The kids from the local sailing clubs on the Peninsula banded together and had group debrief's. This included sailors from Somers, Westernport yacht club, Davies Bay yacht club and Mornington yacht club. Whilst the racing experience was very important, it was equally great for the young sailors to reacquaint themselves

with other friends from other yacht clubs. With constant changes in the weather there is always down time for laughter and playing on the beach

Our next event will be a two day training camp held at Sorrento Sailing Couta Boat Club over the Easter holidays.

Sadly, this past State Championships was Daniel's last event in his Opti. After much deliberation he has decided to join the VLA. We wholeheartedly support this as he will have some great Laser mentors within our family club!





We finished off with a terrific lunch by Lisa and her kind helpers.

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

Sea Rescue



Vale Donald Ede

Donald was born in England, and at an early age fell in love with the sea, and at 15 enrolled in the Merchant Navy as a cadet where he excelled in his studies, then went to sea. He travelled the seven seas extensively until 1960, when marriage to Brisbane girl Euphie prompted a move to a shore job with Seatainers in Melbourne.

The Ede family joined the Yacht Club in the late seventies, and at first Donald sailed a 125 with son Nick, but later moved to a Solo when Nick moved on to sailing with other top young sailors. This was the start of the Ede sailing dynasty at Somers which flourishes to this day with Nick, and his children Lucy and Harrison. Unfortunately Donald was diagnosed with Parkinson's Disease in the late 1990s (as were other ex-Commodores Peter Johns and Alan Angwin), and had to give up sailing around 2002. However, for some years he still helped man the rescue boats, then for some years assisted with race management. Finally he was unable to continue, and had spent the last six years in Shoreham House Aged Care Facility, so would not be known to newer Club members.

Off the water Donald was very active around the Club, both as worker and administrator. He was a flag officer



from 1985 to 1991, the last two years as Commodore, but also organised and participated energetically in numerous working bees. This was the time when Mother Nature endeavoured to wash the Clubhouse away, and Donald led the struggle to save it – ultimately successful! – and amongst many works, older members will remember numerous working bees filling and placing hundreds of sand bags. One of these (empty) was later presented to Donald as a memento.

With John Williams, Donald ran a very successful sailing school for members, and also a separate school for pupils at Somers Primary School. Training was done in a motley collection of boats donated to the Club or on permanent loan, and much maintenance was required. The Edes' cars lived in their carport, whilst their garage was a regular home to Yacht Club boats under repair. His huge contribution to the Club was recognised when he was made an honorary life member, and one of the rescue boats is named in his honour. Sadly, an era has ended.
